NOTICEBOARD

The agenda of forthcoming meetings is displayed in a timely manner on the Parish Council notice board. The noticeboard will be well maintained and up to date. Small posters relating to personal items or local community events can be displayed.

WEBSITE

The central point of information and contact is the parish council website at stanhoe.norfolkparishes.gov.uk. This is a comprehensive and definitive source of information which is updated regularly. The website provides parish council meeting agendas and draft and confirmed minutes, council contact details and policies and procedures.

STANHOE.ORG

The Council contributes to Stanhoe.Org webpage to promote village events and pass on relevant information for parish residents.

SAINTS ALIVE

The parish church has a monthly magazine which includes regular items from the Parish Council. This remains an important communication channel as it reaches households that do not regularly use digital communications.

NEWSLETTERS AND SURVEYS

From time to time the Parish Council may publish a survey or newsletter to gather feedback.

COUNCIL MEETINGS

Members of the public are able to observe parish council meetings and take the opportunity to speak in the Public Session in accordance with Standing Orders.

Communication can be to any Councillor with the response being relayed back via the Clerk .All formal correspondence to the Council should be submitted through the Clerk.
